Bert Carroll Meets Death

Bert Carroll, who formerly lived at this place met a tragic death Friday morning about 4 o'clock, at Sunrise where he was working as a brakeman on the C&W. It is not known just how the accident happened which cost the unfortunate man his life, but when the body was found it was discovered that the entire train consisting of an engine and 14 ore cars had passed over his body.

The deceased is survived by a little daughter about seven years of age, besides a wife to whom he was just married in June. A sister of the deceased, Mrs. Coll Morrison, and brother, Geo. Carroll, besides the parents, Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Carroll, reside at Wheatland. Other relatives live in Colorado.

The remains were shipped to Wheatland Saturday and funeral services were held in the Congregational church on Sunday afternoon, being conducted by Rev. C.H. Gilmore, interment being made in the Wheatland cemetery.

The deceased was a member of Black Hills Lodge No. 190, Brotherhood Railway Trainman, at Chadron, Nebr., which organization he joined about five weeks ago. The lodge forwarded a beautiful floral wreath in token of the respect in which they held their departed member, and a number of the members of the order, J.M. Winship, E.M. Crone and John McHenry of Sunrise, and Hugh Currie, of Chadron, were present at the funeral accompanying the remains to this place.

The deceased was 33 years and 29 days of age, and was a member of Wheatland Camp. No. 330, W.O.W. in which order he carried a \$2,000 policy.
