

GREENHALGH, GEORGE RICHARD

June 5, 1905-March 31, 1937

George Greenhalgh, who lived in the Glendo community from 1934 until 1936, was instantly killed at Paradise Valley, Idaho, on March 31<sup>st</sup> when he was struck by a falling tree. Greenhalgh and another man had been getting out white pine logs, and had sawn a small tree, about 14 inches in diameter, and stood back as it started to fall. A light wind is thought to have caused the falling tree to strike another tree and the impact of the top as it hit the ground caused the butt end to swing about eight feet, striking Greenhalgh on the side of the head.

George Richard Greenhalgh was born June 5, 1905 near Guide Rock, Nebr. On Jan. 23, 1936, he was united in marriage to Lucille Hytrek, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hytrek of the Glendo community. They left Wyoming in June of 1936 and went to Bonners Ferry, Idaho, where they have since made their home.

The deceased is survived by his wife and a daughter, born to them in February of this year, his mother, six sisters, and three brothers, most of whom live in Nebraska.

Mrs. Greenhalgh was prostrated when she learned of her husband's death, and was taken to the local hospital.

The body was brought to Wheatland by train and services were conducted from the local Catholic church Wednesday morning. Interment was made in the Wheatland cemetery. Many out of town relatives and friends were present for the funeral. Miss Josephine Hytrek of Washington D.C. arrived Sunday to be with her sister.
