Johnny passed away peacefully on Monday, November 8, 2021 at the Platte County Legacy Home in Wheatland after a lengthy battle with cancer.

Johnny was born on Sunday, November 3, 1946 in Wheatland, the son of Walter and Mollie (Eichler) Lockman. He was the fourth child born to the couple, although only two children, Johnny and his brother, Walter "Dick", survived infancy. Johnny was raised in the Wheatland area by his father, Walter and step mother, Mary. His Aunt Esther Lockman and Uncle Ben Lockman also helped care for Johnny after the untimely passing of his mother. Johnny loved Wheatland and enjoyed farming with his family.

Growing up, Johnny participated in several sports and was an outstanding baseball and basketball player, Captain of the 1965 basketball team. He was also a dedicated student Salutatorian of the Class of 1965 and attended the University of Wyoming where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Biochemistry and later the University of Massachusetts where he graduated with a Master degree in Medical Technology. After briefly working abroad in Saudi Arabia and more locally in Denver as a Medical Technologist, Johnny returned to Wheatland and his farming roots. It was then that he met and married Patti Mills. The couple had two sons during the course of their marriage, Travis Lee and Tyler Jackson "T.J.". Upon his return to Wheatland, Johnny farmed for Rex Goertz and ultimately became head groundskeeper at Wheatland Golf Club where he worked until he retired.

An avid sports enthusiast, Johnny was a lifelong Boston Red Sox and Denver Broncos fan. Johnny loved watching his teams compete and bonded over sports with his two



sons. Johnny was ecstatic to witness the Boston Red Sox break the curse of the great Bambino in 2004 and got to cheer the Red Sox on in their three subsequent World Series titles. The Denver Broncos also surprised him with three Super Bowl wins.

Johnny's love of the Denver Broncos and Boston Red Sox was surpassed only by his love of being a father. He enjoyed coaching his boys in various sports and watching them compete. A proponent of higher education, Johnny was thrilled that both of his sons not only pursued college degrees, but he was especial-

ly proud that they chose his former alma mater, the University of Wyoming.

In his adult years, Johnny was an outstanding slowpitch softball player helping his teams to numerous tour nament wins. He also enjoyed refereeing basketball and playing just about any spor going on in Wheatland. He was an avid cribbage playe winning many tournament and a social poker playe earning the nickname from his son, TJ, "Johnny Bluff" In his later years, Johnn was not typically found si ting on the couch but walkin all over the town and watcl ing his son, Travis, carry o his legacy of coaching h daughters in sports.

Johnny was blessed wit four grandchildren, MacKe zie "Kenzie" Dawn, Camry "Camy" Hope, Beckett Ree and Blair Reagan and low nothing more than being grandfather. He loved water ing them all grow and reished in all their accomplisments. Johnny shared a special bond with Camy and the bond, along with his bel that there was nothing the she couldn't accomplish, ke Johnny energized every da

Johnny is survived by his brother, Dick (Bobbie) Lockman; two sons, Travis Lockman and TJ (Ashley) Lockman; step sister, Sally Bohl; four grandchildren, Kenzie Lockman, Camy Lockman, Beckett Lockman, and Blair Lockman; cousins, Joyce Nolan, Benny (Bonnie) Lockman, and Carol (Jeff) Billing.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Molly and Walter Lockman; two siblings, William David and Carol Elaine; his aunt, Esther Lockman; uncle, Ben Lockman; and his step mother, Mary Higdem.
