

Frank Delos Robinson was born to Howard and Elizabeth Robinson on May 8, 1914 in Wheatland. He died in Cheyenne on Sept. 30, 1982 at the age of 68 years.

The Robinsons were an early pioneer family who came to the area in 1884. Frank grew up on a farm East of Wheatland. He attended and graduated from the Wheatland schools.

He was a veteran of World War II. As a member of the Army Air Corps, Frank was awarded a field commission in recognition for his outstanding service as the Supply Officer in charge of establishing and dismantling an American military base in Great Britain.

On June 20, 1943, he married Anna Maxine Early in the historic Carey Mansion in Cheyenne. They had one daughter, Ann, a professor at Western, Ill. University. In addition to his wife and daughter, he is survived by his sister, Mrs. Le Grande Page of Wheatland; a niece, JaNell Page Hunter and a nephew, James Page.

He was a life-long resident of Wheatland. As a farmer, he maintained an intense interest in the conservation and protection of the Wyoming land and heritage. A memorial has been established in his name to the Laramie Peak Museum.

Services were held Sun., Oct. 3, 1982 at the United Church of Christ in Wheatland with the Father Sid Hoadley officiating. Those serving as pallbearers were John Allen, Darrow Blow, Clark Fritz, Dexter Howe, Del Landen, and Owen Short.

Honorary pallbearers were Racy Clark, Charles Coleman, Howard Fish, Ray Lamborn, Jerry Landen, Fred Phifer, Clayton Russell, and L.A. "Toad" Shepard.
